

## Looking for a challenge? You're in the right place...

For all fishing fans who like a particular type of challenge and want to be at one with nature, the mountain stream that flows at speed through the Stanglwirt's fishing waters presents numerous areas of sheltered, eddying pools with shallows that the fish like to use as their "kindergarten".

Every day from **May to October** you can fish for **river** and **rainbow trout** (the main types of fish), as well as **grayling**, **indigenous Tyrolean trout** and **Danube salmon**.

**Johannes Hauser, junior director** at Stanglwirt and a passionate angler, will be happy to share his "secret tips" about the diverse environment.

The Hauser family are devoted to ensuring that nature continues to flourish, and flora and fauna continue to thrive.



### Equipment recommended by Johannes Hauser includes

- a **fly rod** between 240 and 270 centimetres long, with a **line weight** of between 4 and 6, and
- various gold bead nymphs and dry flies (deer hair or CDC).
- Kit should also include **chest waders** or **wading boots**.

Depending on the weather, we also recommend warm underwear, a raincoat, a cap or hat and sunglasses. We operate a "catch and release" policy in our waters and request that you use barbless hooks!

## Everything in the river

#### The Stanglwirt acquired the fishing rights to a network of streams.

Fishing rights in Tyrolean waters have been the prerogative of one individual since time immemorial: once someone has acquired them, this prized asset is handed down from generation to generation.

A reallocation of licences is therefore akin to a once-in-a-century event - and the Stanglwirt has taken that opportunity to acquire the rights to an extensive river system. Johannes Hauser: "The tiny stream has its source in the Kaiser mountains and also runs through the grounds of the Stanglwirt. The whole region, excluding tributaries, is 14 kilometres long, extending to Ellmau, St. Johann and Kitzbühel." For him, it is an honour to have a duty of responsibility for this huge slice of nature. "With rights come responsibilities. We have to take care of the waters." In fact, the Stanglwirt has a say in many decisions that could affect the waters.

And anyone who knows the Stanglwirt, will know that this responsibility is not taken lightly. Johannes Hauser: "Protecting nature is always the focus; we want to keep the streams as natural as possible." His focus is on the well-being of the classic Tyrolean fish in these small rivers, the river trout and grayling. Hauser's aim is for the existing fish stock to reproduce by itself, thus ensuring a natural population. The granting of fishing licences is therefore highly selective. "People can learn how to fly fish here at the Stanglwirt, although naturally in line with the catch and release policy:

the fish are released as soon as they are caught. They should enjoy a good life at the Stanglwirt, just like any other life form."



# What do you need to be able to fish in the Tyrol?

There are two options for fishing in the Stanglwirt's waters and the surrounding Tyrolean streams:

#### 1. Guest fishing pass

We recommend that guests and occasional anglers purchase the guest fishing pass. The guest fishing pass for angling in the Stanglwirt's waters is available from the concierge. You must be aged 14 or over and provide evidence that you have the appropriate technical skills.

#### Evidence of appropriate technical skills:

- Tyrolean angling verification or Tyrolean fisheries control verification
- Tyrolean fishing pass (lapsed confirmation of training also remains valid)
- Angling verification from other federal states
- Valid official fishing pass from another federal state
- Proficiency equivalent to the Tyrolean verification is as follows:
- South Tyrolean angling verification, German Fishing licence or Swiss SaNa Fishing certificate, etc.

Validity of guest fishing pass: 14 days, cost: € 25.00

#### Or

#### Tyrolean fishing pass

The Tyrolean fishing pass is valid throughout the Tyrol and must always be carried when fishing or catching fish. No fishing pass is required for fishing ponds.

The Tyrolean fishing pass grants you automatic membership to the Tyrolean Fishing Association. The Tyrolean fishing pass is available from the respective district administrative authorities/district administrations.

**Appropriate skills:** the Tyrolean fishing pass is valid as evidence of the appropriate technical skills (relevant training) that is required to enable you to fish inthe Tyrol. **Validity:** 1 calendar year, cost: € 100.00 (on initial application; following year € 50.00).

#### 2. Day licence

In addition, you always need to obtain a day licence for angling in the Stanglwirt's waters (€ 70.00 for hotel guests, € 90.00 for non-hotel guests). The licence is assigned to the individual and is therefore not transferable.





#### What do I need to take with me when fishing?

- A valid fishing-district licence (day or annual licence)
- Tyrolean fishing pass or guest fishing pass
- Photo ID (e.g. driving licence)
- A signed angling pass with details of the fishing district

#### Organisation of fishing in the Tyrol

Fishing in the Tyrol is subject to civil law. Waters are therefore split into some 400 districts. Fishing is a right registered in the land register for each district, regardless of property ownership. Tributaries are associated with the respective district. Thus, no stretch of water may be fished without a permit. The districts are specified by the district administrations in a fishery cadaster.

As well as specifying the location, this also specifies the proprietor, tenant or manager and the angling supervisor responsible for each district. The angling supervisor is permitted to inspect and monitor any equipment, catches, paperwork, etc. associated with fishing! The authorities issue a limited number of fishing passes for each district.

Named passes are valid for the whole year, for one person only (with photo ID). Guest passes (day passes) May be issued on a daily basis by owners of fishing rights, tenants or managers.

They are only valid for one day in the district specified for the person concerned. Permits are issued for fishing ponds by the person responsible for the pond. The regional district committees ensure the protection of the interests of anglers and fish at local level. The Tyrolean fisheries law and associated by-laws form the legal basis of these provisions.

## Stanglwirt - fishing regulation

#### General information

- The day pass must not be given to anyone else!
- Each person enters the site at his/her own risk! (Before selecting your fishing area, please check the damage caused by weathering or animals/take care on uneven surfaces/move to wide-open spaces in the event of a storm or severe weather). No liability is accepted for any damage to persons or things.
- The fishing area is a quiet place! Shouting, loud music, etc. is forbidden!
- Dogs are not permitted in the fishing area!
- Camping, barbecues and the lighting of fires are strictly forbidden throughout the entire fishing area.
- No liability is accepted for property reported as lost or stolen (this also applies to vehicles).
- Fishing documentation, fishing rods and fishing gear must be presented to the owner and supervisory authorities on request. These persons or organisations are also permitted to inspect baggage and vehicles.
- Without exception, all fishing is only permitted with a single barbless hook. Whilst fishing, you must keep the area clean, and tidy up before leaving.
- There is a policy of "catch & release" in all areas.
- There are conditions attached to fly fishing in Austria of which you should make yourself aware before fishing!
- Closed seasons for fishing are clearly specified and we ensure strict compliance at all times.



#### Closed seasons

There are conditions attached to fly fishing in Austria. Closed seasons for fishing are clearly specified and we ensure strict compliance at all times. Fly fishing is only possible in harmony with nature!

Grayling	1 January to 15 May
River trout	1 October to 28 February
Danube trout	1 March to 31 May
Rainbow trout	no closed season

#### Minimum sizes

River trout/rainbow trout	25 to 30 cm
Grayling	42 cm
Danube trout	80 cm
